## Ex-Reliever Baffles Sox

"The pitches just weren't going where I wanted them," Tom Timmerman said apologetically. "I'd try to throw a slider inside but it would end up outside. But I guess I had a lot on 'em."

The apologies were hardly necessary. Detroit's tall right-hander had so much on the ball last night that the Chicago White Sox could barely get their bats on it, ending up with three singles.

The Tigers, meanwhile, had no trouble whatsoever with the offerings served up by four Chicago hurlers, hammering out 14 hits for a 12-0 romp.

Ed Brinkman and Norm Cash each drove in four of the runs as Detroit retained its one-game American League East lead over Baltimore by snapping the White Sox' seven-game winning streak.

TIMMERMAN, almost exclusively a reliever before this season, was hoping to develop into a fourth starter for the Tigers—but shaky showings this spring appeared to have him headed for the bullpen once again.

Once the games started counting, however, he was a different man. In his last outing he pitched seven innings of two-hit ball. His teammates couldn't back him up, though, and he lost 1-0 to the Orioles.

This time he was even more effective, limiting the White Sox to just one hit through the first seven. Still, he couldn't accept his well-deserved praise.

"I had better control in Baltimore . . . I was rushing things too much tonight . . . I did a lot of things wrong," he insisted.

Cash driving in four runs in a game was not so unusual. He's a slugger. But for the light-hitting Brinkman it was a different story. It was the second home game for the Tigers and the second time he was a star. In the first, he'd hit a

# Lennons: Urgency, Frivolity

In the paradox that has become John and Yoko Ono Lennon, the couple spent a day of urgency and frivolity here yesterday, beginning with a press conference called to discuss pending deportation action against them and finishing with a scene-and-be-seen party that had much of quintessential Cleveland Park acting as if the Lennons were the couple to have over for drinks.

A mixture of half coat-'n'-tied, landed professionals and half tiny-boppers, in bare feet, blue jeans and T-shirts (equal proportions of both were after autographs), swarmed around the couple in the home of the Rt. Rev. Paul Moore.

"As shepherd of those living in New York," the bishop said at the morning press conference (he is Bishop Coadjutor of the Diocese of New York, although his family maintains a home here), "I have a spiritual duty to persons living there. Since the Lennons live in New York and John was brought up in the Church of England, I, as Episcopal Bishop, have the obligation to offer comfort in this time of crisis."

Some at the party offered words of support, but more seemed eager for some concrete memento of contact

with a former Beatle. So John obligingly signed autographs for anyone who asked, starting out with personal inscriptions on copies of his newest record, "Woman Is The Nigger Of The World," later going on to scribbling his name on small sheets of paper and finally complying with requests from some of the younger party-goers to "write your name on my arm."

The morning had been much more somber, although Lennon didn't miss a chance to punch some wit into the usual dreariness of press conferences.

"They say I'm illegible . . . or uneligible or whatever," he said, in reference to the U.S. Immigration and Naturalization Service's denial of the couple's appeal for residency. The denial was based on the grounds that Lennon was convicted of possession of marijuana by a British court in 1968.

The Lennons were admitted to the country last summer to participate in custody proceedings regarding Yoko's daughter Kyoko. They were awarded custody by a Texas court, provided that the 8-year-old be raised in the United States. She has still not been seen by



tinue living there and raise Kyoko."

New York Mayor John Lindsay says, "They have personally told me of their love for New York City and that they wish to make it their home."

In a letter to Immigration Commissioner Raymond Farrel, released at the conference yesterday, Lindsay wrote, "I consider it to be very much in the public interest from the point of view of the citizens of New York as well as the citizens of the country that artists of their stature be granted resident status."

"We think the American people wouldn't mind living with us, and they're the ones we want to live with," Lennon said. "The only thing we've ever said is just what Mr. Nixon said on television the other night (Wednes-

day): 'Give peace a chance.'"

Among those the Conference called the National Committee for John and Yoko were jazz musician Ornette Coleman, who had flown in from London, Bishop Moore and the Rev. Frederick Douglass Kirkpatrick, a folksinger and director of the Many Races Cultural Foundation.

"Let's not beat around the bush," Kirkpatrick said. "The reason they're trying to run John and Yoko out of the country is because these two people are telling truths that are opening the eyes of the public — particularly regarding the war in Southeast Asia."

The Lennon's deportation hearing is scheduled for Tuesday in New York.

Mayor Lindsay has written a letter to the Immigration and Naturalization Service calling the deportation proceedings against John Lennon and his wife Yoko Ono "a grave injustice."

Mr. Lennon yesterday called the Mayor's action "a beautiful thing" and said he hoped "no one would be offended by it."

The Lennons have been ordered to appear at a deportation hearing here Tuesday. Mr. Lennon, a British subject, has been unable to renew his visa because of a marijuana conviction in England in 1968.

The Mayor said that the attempt to deport the Lennons was an "unusual and harsh action" and that "artists of their distinction should be allowed to remain here."

Miss Ono—she is known by this name professionally—said in an interview yesterday that the deportation action was "really unjust and cruel treatment" because "they are forcing me to

choose either my husband or my child."

Miss Ono has an 8-year-old daughter, Kyoko, by her previous marriage to Anthony D. Cox. Last month after a two-year legal battle, the Lennons were awarded custody of the child by a Houston civil court. One condition of the award was that the Lennons live in this country.

Since the court ruling the Lennons have not been able to locate either Mr. Cox or Kyoko. But Miss Ono said yesterday that she had "heard from mutual friends that my former husband has said, 'All we have to do is hide until they leave.'"

The Lennons live in a brownstone apartment in Greenwich Village and Miss Ono said: "We both love the Village and New York City and really want to stay. We feel we're being kicked out of our own town."

Another effort to stop the Lennons' deportation came yesterday with the announcement at a news conference in

Washington's National Press Club of the formation of the National Committee for John and Yoko.

John Hendrix, an artist friend of the Lennons, is head of the committee. He said the Government was "trying to throw John and Yoko out of this country for more than

the 1968 marijuana conviction that John had." He said the real reason was the Lennons' "antiwar stand, their ability to affect the thinking of youth and their support of unpopular beliefs."

Miss Ono said at the news conference, in a voice often breaking with emotion, that "I still believe in America, in American justice and the American people and I really would like to stay and look for my daughter."

Later, in an interview, she said she and her husband would like to be able to see through the projects they had begun. The one uppermost in her mind was "to open free music libraries—one in the Village and one in Harlem—that would include all music—classic, jazz and rock."

"All the record companies agreed they would give us records," Miss Ono said. She said she also had convinced Japanese companies to donate stereo equipment and musical instruments.

She got the Japanese to donate the equipment, she said, because she convinced them that they were getting too commercial an image in this country and should do something constructive.

The free music libraries, Miss Ono said, "would have day-care centers where mothers could leave their children, and other rooms where children could take music lessons, free."

"We could have it all ready by autumn," Miss Ono went on, "if we could stay here. We didn't think this deportation thing would come about. It was like a bomb dropped on us."

"We have such a deep sentiment for the city," Miss Ono continued, "that whenever I'm out of New York I miss it desperately."

Mr. Lennon said he now shared those feelings deeply, though he didn't in the past.

#### "I Was Getting Jealous"

A few years ago they were living in Ascot, England, on a 70-acre estate in, as Mr. Lennon describes it, "a beautiful Georgian house."

"But she seemed to be more in love with New York than she was with me and I was getting jealous," he said. "I didn't have that same feeling because all I'd seen of New York was hotels when I was here as a Beatle."

The Lennons said they came here to look around quietly in 1969 and Mr. Lennon said he finally became convinced and now he never wanted to leave.

The stimulation of the city, he said, "is like living in a creative co-op, like a university of artists."

There are some other things, too, like coffee ice-cream malteds, which he never had before. He liked malteds so much he was drinking them at ever turn to the point where he gained so much weight (16 pounds) that he now has to limit himself to two every other day.

He said he would like to visit other parts of America—the Grand Canyon, New Orleans—eventually "but that's in the future."

Had he ever been to New Orleans?

"Only as a Beatle," he answered. "It's the same as not going."

# YOKO FEARS LOSS OF DAUGHTER

## Lennons Ask Help in Visa Case

Exclusive to The Times from Reuters

WASHINGTON — Former Beatle John Lennon and his wife Yoko Ono appealed to the American people Friday to help them stay in the United States.

Yoko, her voice breaking with emotion, told a press conference here that she would have to leave behind her 8-year-old daughter Kyoko if immigration authorities succeed in deporting them.

The couple's entry visas expired Feb. 29 and a hearing on their possible deportation will be held next Tuesday.

Immigration officials have said they are seeking the deportation order because of Lennon's conviction for possession of marijuana in England four years ago.

### Long Custody Battle

The Lennons have been waging a long legal battle for custody of Yoko's daughter by her previous marriage to Anthony Cox. They were granted custody by a Texas court but Yoko said they had been unable to find Cox or the child.

"I still believe in America, American justice and the American people and I really would like to stay here and look for my daughter," Yoko said.

"If we are kicked out, we will lose her," Lennon asserted.

Yoko said the court order granting custody of Kyoko specified that she must be brought up in the United States.

The Lennons' appeal here came soon after it was disclosed that New York Mayor John V. Lindsay had asked the commissioner of the U.S. Immig-

ration and Naturalization Service that the couple be allowed to remain in the country because of their unique contribution to music and art.

Lindsay's letter, dated April 27, noted that the mayor had talked with the Lennons about their im-

migration problems.

"They have personally told me of their love for New York City and that they wish to make it their home," the letter said.

An aide to Lindsay said the mayor spoke with them for about 30 minutes two weeks ago.

# Lindsay Asks John and Yok

Mayor Lindsay has appealed to federal authorities to quash deportation proceedings against former Beate and John Lennon and his wife, Yoko Ono, and to grant them permanent residence status.

In a strongly worded letter to Immigration and Naturalization Service Commissioner Raymond F. Parrol, Lindsay said that "a grave injustice is being perpetrated" by the continuance of the proceedings to deport the Lennons on charges that their visas have expired.

"The only question which is raised against these people is that they do speak out with strong critical voices on major issues of the day," wrote Lindsay.

"If this is the motive underlying the unusual and harsh action taken by the Immigration and Naturalization Service," he continued, "then it is an attempt to silence Constitutionally protected First Amendment rights of free speech and association and denial of the civil liberties of these two people."

Government proceedings against the Lennons have been postponed until next Tuesday to give them more time to file applications for permanent residence.

The chief stumbling block to the applications is Lennon's 1968 conviction in England on marijuana possession charges.

Lindsay wrote that the couple have told him "of their love of New York City" and that they wish to live here.

The Mayor said he has also been made aware of the "tragic breakdown involved in

their desperate effort to find Yoko's 8-year-old child, Kyoko."

Miss Ono has said that her former husband, independent film producer Anthony Cox, has disappeared with Kyoko although a Houston court gave temporary custody of the child to the Lennons.

If they were deported, the Lennons believe, they would lose the child.

In his letter, sent yesterday with a copy going to Attorney General Richard G. Kleindienst, Lindsay said that "this is the type of hardship that our immigration laws must recognize." The Lennons' outsider, he said, would be contrary "to the principles of our country as well as the humanitarian practices which should be implemented by the Dept. of Immigration."

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

## Lennons' Visa Hearing Postponed Until April

New York (AP)—A deportation hearing for former Beatle John Lennon and his wife, Yoko Ono, was postponed today until April 18 to give them time to apply for permanent residence.

Officials said Lennon's 1968 conviction in England of pos-

sessing marijuana was an impediment to extension of their visitors' visas, which expired February 29.

Lennon's lawyer said he hoped to have the conviction expunged from the record.

After the hearing the couple said they want to stay in the United States because New York is "the center of the earth," and because they hope to gain custody of her 8-year-old daughter, Kyoko.

Yoko said they obtained temporary custody of the child in Texas, but that her former husband, Anthony Cos, had "run off with her." Under the court ruling, the Lennons were required to raise the child in the United States.

"If we are deported," she said, "it is synonymous to our losing our child. That is why we are so desperate about it."

# Lennon, Yoko Ono Liable to Deportation

NEW YORK—The district director of the U.S. Immigration and Naturalization Service announced that former Beatle John Lennon and his wife, Yoko Ono, have been asked to appear at a hearing later today to show cause why they should not be deported.

The director, Saul Marks, said the couple had been admitted on visitor's visas

"some time ago" and their visas had lapsed on Feb. 29. Neither Lennon nor his manager, Allen B. Klein, was available for comment on the matter but a source close to Klein said he knew nothing of the order.

Marks described the show cause order as serving mainly to notify the couple of the hearing and that they had let themselves become liable to deportation.

John Lennon is esconced in a New York studio rehearsing with Elephant's Memory, a rock group oriented to radical politics which is said to be his new band. Lennon is reportedly planning a "peoples' tour" by the new Lennon-Memory band, to play benefit concerts, but whom the tour will benefit has not been revealed.

Lennon had made few appearances since the breakup of the Beatles, save for a few appearances with the Plastic Ono Band and a recent benefit for radical leader John Sinclair. Elephant's Memory is a relatively obscure New York band, with the same radical righteousness evidenced a few years ago by MC5.

Lennon now is living in Greenwich Village with his wife, Yoko Ono, who recently had a showing of "objects" at a New York gallery. One source said Lennon has applied for immigration papers. "I don't know if he is asking for citizenship, but he has definitely landed," the source said.





## JOHN LENNON

John Lennon, presently visiting in the United States, is a British citizen. He was a member of the former musical group known as "The Beatles." He has claimed a date of birth of September 10, 1940, and he is presently married to a Japanese citizen, one Yoko Ono.

The December 12, 1971, issue of the New York Times shows that Lennon and his wife appeared for about 10 minutes at about 3:00 a.m. on December 11, 1971, at a rally held in Ann Arbor, Michigan, to protest the continuing imprisonment of John Sinclair, a radical poet.

Radical New Left leaders Rennie Davis, Jerry Rubin, Leslie Bacon, Stu Albert, Jay Craven, and others have recently gone to the New York City area. This group has been strong advocates of the program to "dump Nixon." They have devised a plan to hold rock concerts in various primary election states for the following purposes: to obtain access to college campuses; to stimulate 18-year old registration; to press for legislation legalizing marijuana; to finance their activities; and to recruit persons to come to San Diego during the Republican National Convention in August 1972. These individuals are the same persons who were instrumental in disrupting the Democratic National Convention in Chicago in 1968.

According to a confidential source, whose information has proved reliable in the past, the activities of Davis and his group will follow the pattern of the rally mentioned above with reference to John Sinclair. David Sinclair, the brother of John, will be the road manager for these rock festivals.

Davis and his cohorts intend to use John Lennon as a drawing card to promote the success of the rock festivals and rallies. The source feels that this will pour tremendous amounts of money into the coffers of the New Left and can only inevitably lead to a clash between a controlled mob organized by this group and law enforcement officials in San Diego.

The source felt that if Lennon's visa is terminated it would be a strategy counter-measure. The source also noted the caution which must be taken with regard to the possible alienation of the so-called 18-year old vote if Lennon is expelled from the country.


