DISCUSSION: The application was denied by the District Director, Washington, D.C. and is now before the Administrative Appeals Office (AAO) on appeal. The appeal will be dismissed.

The applicant is a native and citizen of Pakistan who is seeking to adjust his status to that of lawful permanent resident under section 13 of the Act of 1957 ("Section 13"), Pub. L. No. 85-316, 71 Stat. 642, as modified, 95 Stat. 1611, 8 U.S.C. § 1255b, as an alien whose family member performed diplomatic or semi-diplomatic duties under section 101(a)(15)(A)(ii) of the Immigration and Nationality Act, 8 U.S.C. § 1101(a)(15)(A)(ii).

The district director denied the Application to Register Permanent Residence or Adjust Status (Form I-485) of the applicant's father after determining that the applicant's father had failed to demonstrate that compelling reasons prevent his and his family's return to Pakistan. *Decision of District Director*, dated October 25, 2007. The district director denied the applicant's adjustment application on the basis of her father's ineligibility for benefits under Section 13. Counsel has appealed both decisions.

In a separate decision, the AAO has dismissed the appeal of the applicant's father on the ground that his duties were clerical and menial in nature, rather than diplomatic or semi-diplomatic, and that he failed to establish compelling reasons that prevent his return to Pakistan as required under Section 13. As the applicant's eligibility for adjustment under Section 13 derives from the eligibility of her father, the applicant therefore is also ineligible for adjustment of status.

For the reasons discussed above, the AAO finds that the applicant is not eligible for adjustment under Section 13. Pursuant to section 291 of the Act, 8 U.S.C. 1361, the burden of proof is upon the applicant to establish that she is eligible for adjustment of status. The applicant has failed to meet that burden. Accordingly, the appeal will be dismissed.

ORDER: The appeal is dismissed.
