



DISCUSSION: The nonimmigrant visa petition was denied by the Director, Nebraska Service Center, and is now before the Associate Commissioner for Examinations on appeal. The appeal will be sustained.

The petitioner seeks to employ the beneficiary as a computer programmer for a period of two years and 10 1/2 months. The director determined the petitioner had not established that the offered position is a specialty occupation.

On appeal, the petitioner argues that the offered position is a specialty occupation and the beneficiary is qualified to perform the duties of a specialty occupation.

Section 101(a) (15) (H) (i) (b) of the Immigration and Nationality Act (the Act), 8 U.S.C. 1101(a) (15) (H) (i) (b), provides in part for nonimmigrant classification to qualified aliens who are coming temporarily to the United States to perform services in a specialty occupation. Section 214(i) (1) of the Act, 8 U.S.C. 1184(i) (1), defines a "specialty occupation" as an occupation that requires theoretical and practical application of a body of highly specialized knowledge, and attainment of a bachelor's or higher degree in the specific specialty (or its equivalent) as a minimum for entry into the occupation in the United States.

Pursuant to section 214(i) (2) of the Act, 8 U.S.C. 1184(i) (2), to qualify as an alien coming to perform services in a specialty occupation the beneficiary must hold full state licensure to practice in the occupation, if such licensure is required to practice in the occupation. In addition, the beneficiary must have completed the degree required for the occupation, or have experience in the specialty equivalent to the completion of such degree and recognition of expertise in the specialty through progressively responsible positions relating to the specialty.

Pursuant to 8 C.F.R. 214.2(h) (4) (iii) (C), to qualify to perform services in a specialty occupation, the alien must meet one of the following criteria:

1. Hold a United States baccalaureate or higher degree required by the specialty occupation from an accredited college or university;
2. Hold a foreign degree determined to be equivalent to a United States baccalaureate or higher degree required by the specialty occupation from an accredited college or university;
3. Hold an unrestricted State license, registration, or certification which authorizes him or her to fully practice the specialty occupation and be immediately

engaged in that specialty in the state of intended employment; or

4. Have education, specialized training, and/or progressively responsible experience that is equivalent to completion of a United States baccalaureate or higher degree in the specialty occupation and have recognition of expertise in the specialty through progressively responsible positions directly related to the specialty.

The beneficiary attained a Bachelor of Engineering degree in Instrumentation Technology in August 1995 from Bangalore University in India. The record shows he has obtained experience as a computer systems analyst and has attended various courses in the field of computer science. Accordingly, it is concluded that the beneficiary qualifies to perform the duties of the offered position.

The term "specialty occupation" is defined at 8 C.F.R. 214.2(h)(4)(ii) as:

an occupation which requires theoretical and practical application of a body of highly specialized knowledge in fields of human endeavor including, but not limited to, architecture, engineering, mathematics, physical sciences, social sciences, medicine and health, education, business specialties, accounting, law, theology, and the arts, and which requires the attainment of a bachelor's degree or higher in a specific specialty, or its equivalent, as a minimum for entry into the occupation in the United States.

Pursuant to 8 C.F.R. 214.2(h)(4)(iii)(A), to qualify as a specialty occupation, the position must meet one of the following criteria:

1. A baccalaureate or higher degree or its equivalent is normally the minimum requirement for entry into the particular position;
2. The degree requirement is common to the industry in parallel positions among similar organizations or, in the alternative, an employer may show that its particular position is so complex or unique that it can be performed only by an individual with a degree;
3. The employer normally requires a degree or its equivalent for the position; or
4. The nature of the specific duties is so specialized and complex that knowledge required to perform the duties is usually associated with the attainment of a baccalaureate or higher degree.

The duties of the offered position are described as:

Mr. Kamat will be given the objectives of a particular project. He will write program specifications and programs for the project, modify existing programs and make code changes to achieve the desired results. He will then verify that the programs are working according to user specifications and test the programs to insure that quality requirements are met and successfully implemented. Additionally, he will analyze his work to determine whether his programming impacts upon other systems and interfaces. Finally he will determine what changes are necessary based upon the analysis and testing, and then execute the changes to ensure the desired results have been achieved. This responsibility requires a great amount of independent analysis and understanding of the intricate interconnectedness of the systems and how changes in one program may adversely affect other programs and subsystems. (70%)

Provide on-call production support to ensure customer requirements are satisfied. This requires quick response to production problems and an ability to successfully resolve problems through critical analysis under tight time constraints. Problem resolution also requires strategizing with others in providing directions to computer operations staff on recovery steps. (8%)

Develop and maintain production job flows, automate processing and perform testing to identify changes to programs as well as production flow. This requires knowledge of algorithms and the theoretical basis supporting computer applications to develop the software to properly calculate policy rates, generate bills and process transactions. (15%)

Document system and program changes. (5%)

Create or modify database structures by creating Oracle tables and associated data for testing program changes. This also involves creating, modifying or manipulating production databases to satisfy new project requirements or to make correction for production issues. (2%)

The record indicates that the beneficiary will be working under the supervision of the Division Manager of the "NIS" Systems Unit within Nationwide Insurance's Auto Solutions Department. He will be a member of a team which currently consists of four programmer analysts, eight computer programmers, and two business systems analysts.

The offered position describes the duties of a computer systems analyst. The Department of Labor's Occupational Outlook Handbook, 2000-2001 edition, at pages 111-112 indicates that the usual requirement for employment as a computer scientist or engineer is a baccalaureate degree in computer science, information science, or management information systems. It is concluded that the petitioner has demonstrated that the offered position is a specialty occupation within the meaning of the regulations.

The burden of proof in these proceedings rests solely with the petitioner. Section 291 of the Act, 8 U.S.C. 1361. The petitioner has sustained that burden. Accordingly, the appeal will be sustained and the petition will be approved.

ORDER: The appeal is sustained. The director's order is withdrawn and the petition is approved.
