



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**DISCUSSION:** The delivery bond in this matter was declared breached by the District Director, Miami, Florida, and is now before the Associate Commissioner for Examinations on appeal. The appeal will be dismissed.

The record indicates that on October 14, 1988 the obligor posted a \$3,000 bond conditioned for the delivery of the aboverefetenced alien. A Notice to Deliver Alien (Form I-340) dated March 14, 2000 was sent to the obligor via certified mail, return receipt requested. The notice demanded the bonded alien's surrender to the Immigration and Naturalization Service (the Service) for interview at 9:00 a.m. on April 4, 2000 at [REDACTED], FL 33138. The obligor failed to produce the alien, and the alien failed to appear as required. On May 10, 2000, the district director informed the obligor that the delivery bond had been breached.

On appeal, the obligor asserts that through no fault of the alien, the alien was prevented access to the INS building as a result of the Elian Gonzalez demonstrations. The obligor states that a request to reschedule the interview was refused by the Service. The obligor states that the bonded alien has not previously failed to appear for more than 12 years.

Delivery bonds are violated if the obligor fails to cause the bonded alien to be produced or to produce himself/herself to an immigration officer or immigration judge, as specified in the appearance notice, upon each and every written request until removal proceedings are finally terminated, or until the said alien is actually accepted by the Service for detention or removal. Matter of Smith, 16 I&N Dec. 146 (Reg. Corom. 1977).

The regulations provide that an obligor shall be released from liability where there has been "substantial performance" of all conditions imposed by the terms of the bond. 8 C.F.R. 103.6(6) (3). A bond is breached when there has been a substantial violation of the stipulated conditions of the bond. 8 C.F.R. 103.6(e).

8 C.F.R. 103.5a(a) (2) provides that personal service may be effected by any of the following:

- (i) Delivery of a copy personally;
- (ii) Delivery of a copy at a person's dwelling house or usual place of abode by leaving it with some person of suitable age and discretion;
- (iii) Delivery of a copy at the office of an attorney or other person including a corporation, by leaving it with a person in charge;
- (iv) Mailing a copy by certified or registered mail, return receipt requested, addressed to a person at his last known address.

The bond (Form I-352) provides in pertinent part that the obligor "agrees that any notice to him/her in connection with this bond may be accomplished by mail directed to him/her at the above address." In this case, the Form I-352 listed 1815 N.W. 7th Street, Miami, FL 33125 as the obligor's address.

Contained in the record is a certified mail receipt which indicates that the Notice to Deliver Alien was sent to the obligor at 1815 N.W. 7th Street, Miami, FL 33125 on March 14, 2000. This notice demanded that the obligor produce the bonded alien for removal on April 4, 2000. The receipt also indicates the obligor received notice to produce the bonded alien on March 15, 2000. Consequently, the record clearly establishes that the district director properly served notice on the obligor in compliance with 8 C.F.R. 103.5a(a) (2) (iv).

Furthermore, it is clear from the language used in the bond agreement that the obligor shall cause the alien to be produced or the alien shall produce himself to a Service officer upon each and every request of such officer until removal proceedings are either finally terminated or the alien is accepted by the Service for detention or removal.

In response to the assertions on appeal, the Service indicates that the office conducted 39 interviews on April 4, 2000 and numerous more during that week. The obligor's assertion is unsupported in the record.

It must be noted that delivery bonds are exacted to insure that aliens will be produced when and where required by the Service for hearings or removal. Such bonds are necessary in order for the Service to function in an orderly manner. The courts have long considered the confusion which would result if aliens could be surrendered at any time or place it suited their or the surety's convenience. Matter of L-, 3 I&N Dec. 862 (C.O. 1950). See also, Matter of Allied-Fidelity Insurance Co., 19 I&N 124 (Comm. 1984).

After a careful review of the record, it is concluded that the conditions of the bond have been substantially violated and the collateral has been forfeited. The decision of the district director will not be disturbed.

**ORDER:** The appeal is dismissed.
