DISCUSSION: The delivery bond in this matter was declared breached by the District Director, San Diego, California, and is now before the Associate Commissioner for Examinations on appeal. The appeal will be rejected.

The record indicates that on September 12, 2001, the obligor posted a \$10,000 bond conditioned for the delivery of the above referenced alien. A Notice to Deliver Alien (Form I-340) dated December 1, 2001, was sent to the obligor via certified mail, return receipt requested. The notice demanded the bonded alien's surrender to the Immigration and Naturalization Service (the Service) for removal at 9:00 a.m. on December 21, 2001, at 880 Front Street, Room 2242, San Diego, CA 92101. The obligor failed to present the alien, and the alien failed to appear as required. On January 18, 2002, the district director informed the obligor that the delivery bond had been breached.

The appeal has been filed by the individual who executed a written instrument with the obligor.

An immigration bond is a contract between the Service and the obligor. The obligor or his attorney-in-fact is the proper party to appeal the Service decision to breach the bond. See Matter of Insurance Company of North America, 17 I&N Dec. 251 (Act. Reg. Comm. 1978).

ORDER: The appeal is rejected, and the district director's decision is affirmed.
