



**DISCUSSION:** The delivery bond in this matter was declared breached by the Field Office Director, Detention and Removal, Phoenix, Arizona, and is now before the Administrative Appeals Office on appeal. The appeal will be rejected.

The record indicates that on June 20, 2003, the obligor posted a \$7,000 bond conditioned for the delivery of the above referenced alien. A Notice to Deliver Alien (Form I-340) dated December 30, 2003, was sent to the obligor via certified mail, return receipt requested. The notice demanded the bonded alien's surrender into the custody of an officer of Immigration and Customs Enforcement (ICE) at 11:00 a.m. on February 11, 2004, at [REDACTED]. The obligor failed to present the alien, and the alien failed to appear as required. On February 21, 2004, the field office director informed the obligor that the delivery bond had been breached.

The regulation at 8 C.F.R. § 103.2(a)(1) provides, in part, that “[e]very application, petition, appeal, motion, request ... shall be executed and filed in accordance with the instructions on the form, such instructions ... being hereby incorporated into the particular section of the regulations in this chapter requiring its submission.” The instructions at item six on the appeal Form I-290B specifically require a signature of this form when the decision is appealed.

The Form I-290B was not signed by the obligor. Therefore, the appeal has not been properly filed, and must be rejected.

**ORDER:** The appeal is rejected.
