**DISCUSSION:** The delivery bond in this matter was declared breached by the Director, Headquarters, Bonds, Immigration and Customs Enforcement (ICE), and is now before the Administrative Appeals Office (AAO) on appeal. The appeal will be sustained.

The record indicates that March 14, 2006, the obligor posted a \$1,500 bond conditioned for the delivery of the above referenced alien. A Notice to Deliver Alien (Form I-340) dated April 4, 2007, was sent to the obligor via certified mail, return receipt requested. The notice demanded the bonded alien's surrender into the custody of ICE at 10:00 a.m. within five days of April 24, 2007, at the nearest ICE, Detention and Removal Office. The obligor failed to present the alien, and the alien failed to appear as required. On June 18, 2007, the director informed the obligor that the delivery bond had been breached.

The record reflects that a removal hearing was held on March 7, 2006, and the alien was granted voluntary departure from the United States on or before July 5, 2006.

On appeal, the obligor asserts that the bonded alien had voluntarily departed to Jamaica. As evidence, the obligor submits photocopies of the alien's Form I-94, a landing stamp of July 4, 2006 from the Jamaican immigration, and a Form G-146 from the United States Embassy in Kingston, Jamaica indicating the alien departed the United States on July 4 2006. On October 3, 2007, the authenticity of the Form G-146 was verified by the United States Embassy in Kingston, Jamaica.

Based on the documentation from the United States Embassy in Kingston, Jamaica establishing that the bonded alien timely departed the United States, the director's decision to breach the bond will be withdrawn, and the bond will be canceled.

**ORDER:** The appeal is sustained. The field office director's decision declaring the bond breached is withdrawn, and the bond will be canceled.
