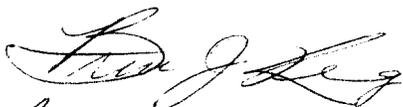

DISCUSSION: The application was denied by the Director, Vermont Service Center, and is now before the Administrative Appeals Office on appeal. The appeal will be dismissed.

The applicant is a native and citizen of El Salvador who is seeking Temporary Protected Status (TPS) under section 244 of the Immigration and Nationality Act (the Act), 8 U.S.C. § 1254.

The director denied the application because the applicant failed to establish he had resided in the United States as of February 13, 2001, and had been continuously physically present in the United States since March 9, 2001, to the date of filing his application.

On appeal, the applicant asserts his claim of eligibility for TPS and submits evidence in support of his claim.

Section 244(c) of the Act, and the related regulations in 8 C.F.R. § 244.2, provide that an applicant is eligible for TPS only if such alien establishes that he or she:

- (a) Is a national, as defined in section 101(a)(21) of the Act, of a foreign state designated under section 244(b) of the Act;
- (b) Has been continuously physically present in the United States since the effective date of the most recent designation of that foreign state;
- (c) Has continuously resided in the United States since such date as the Attorney General may designate;
- (d) Is admissible as an immigrant except as provided under § 244.3;
- (e) Is not ineligible under § 244.4; and
- (f)
 - (1) Registers for Temporary Protected Status during the initial registration period announced by public notice in the FEDERAL REGISTER, or
 - (2) During any subsequent extension of such designation if at the time of the initial registration period:
 - (i) The applicant is a nonimmigrant or has been granted voluntary departure status or any relief from removal;
 - (ii) The applicant has an application for change of status, adjustment of status, asylum, voluntary departure, or any relief from removal which is pending or subject to further review or appeal;

(iii) The applicant is a parolee or has a pending request for reparole; or

(iv) The applicant is a spouse or child of an alien currently eligible to be a TPS registrant.

The phrase *continuously physically present*, as defined in 8 C.F.R. § 244.1, means actual physical presence in the United States for the entire period specified in the regulations. An alien shall not be considered to have failed to maintain continuous physical presence in the United States by virtue of brief, casual, and innocent absences as defined within this section.

The phrase *continuously resided*, as defined in 8 C.F.R. § 244.1, means residing in the United States for the entire period specified in the regulations. An alien shall not be considered to have failed to maintain continuous residence in the United States by reason of a brief, casual and innocent absence as defined within this section or due merely to a brief temporary trip abroad required by emergency or extenuating circumstances outside the control of the alien.

The phrase *brief, casual, and innocent absence*, as defined in 8 C.F.R. § 244.1, means a departure from the United States that satisfies the following criteria:

- (1) Each such absence was of short duration and reasonably calculated to accomplish the purpose(s) for the absence;
- (2) The absence was not the result of an order of deportation, an order of voluntary departure, or an administrative grant of voluntary departure without the institution of deportation proceedings; and
- (3) The purposes for the absence from the United States or actions while outside of the United States were not contrary to law.

Persons applying for TPS offered to El Salvadorans must demonstrate continuous residence in the United States since February 13, 2001, and continuous physical presence in the United States since March 9, 2001. On July 9, 2002, the Attorney General announced an extension of the TPS designation until September 9, 2003. A subsequent extension of the TPS designation has been granted by the Secretary of the Department of Homeland Security, with validity until March 9, 2005, upon the applicant's re-registration during the requisite time period.

The burden of proof is upon the applicant to establish that he or she meets the above requirements. Applicants shall submit all documentation as required in the instructions or requested by Citizenship and Immigration Services (CIS). 8 C.F.R. § 244.9(a). The sufficiency of all evidence will be judged according to its relevancy, consistency, credibility, and probative value. To meet his or her burden of proof the applicant must provide supporting documentary evidence of eligibility apart from his or her own statements. 8 C.F.R. § 244.9(b).

On June 3, 2003, the applicant was requested to submit evidence establishing his residence in the United States as of February 13, 2001, and physical presence in the United States from March 9, 2001, to the date of filing his application. The applicant did not respond to the director's request; therefore, the director determined that the applicant had failed to establish his eligibility for TPS and denied the application on August 8, 2003.

On appeal, the applicant submits the following evidence in support of his claim of eligibility for TPS: copies of his Social Security card and Employment Authorization; copies of subleases for a one bedroom apartment in Leesburg, Virginia, reflecting the lease terms from December 1, 2000 through December 31, 2003; various copies of earning statements from Benchmark Hospitality showing pay periods from September 14, 2001 through August 15, 2003; copies of earning statements from Blake Landscaping indicating pay periods ending on June 26, 2001 and July 31, 2001; and a copy of a letter dated April 15, 2002, from N [REDACTED] who stated that the applicant was employed by the Tuscarora Mill Restaurant in Leesburg, Virginia, from May 27, 1997 through December 4, 1999.

The earning statements provided by the applicant post-date the requisite time periods for El Salvador TPS by three months. It is also noted that the Social Security number printed on the earning statements from Benchmark Hospitality and Blake Landscaping is not the same as that found on the copy of his Social Security card provided by the applicant on appeal. Further, the address reflected on earning statements from Benchmark Hospitality dated September 14, 2001 through August 15, 2003, is [REDACTED] however, the address on the lease agreements for November 1, 2001 through December 31, 2002, and January 1, 2003 through December 31, 2003, is [REDACTED]. The lease agreements provided by the applicant are not supported by other corroborative evidence, such as receipts, or cancelled checks, for payment of rent or utilities. Further, the letter from [REDACTED] indicates that the applicant had worked for her restaurant; however, the applicant's employment period pre-dates the requisite time period for TPS by over one year, specifically, May 27, 1997 through December 4, 1999.

The sufficiency of all evidence will be judged according to its relevancy, consistency, credibility, and probative value. 8 C.F.R. § 244.9(b). The applicant has not submitted sufficient credible evidence to establish his qualifying residence in the United States as of February 13, 2001, or his continuous physical presence in the United States since March 9, 2001. He has, therefore, failed to establish that he has met the criteria described in 8 C.F.R. § 244.2(b) and (c). Consequently, the director's decision to deny the application for TPS will be affirmed.

An alien applying for TPS has the burden of proving that he or she meets the requirements enumerated above and is otherwise eligible under the provisions of section 244 of the Act. The applicant has failed to meet this burden.

ORDER: The appeal is dismissed.
