



DISCUSSION: The **applicant's Temporary Protected Status** was withdrawn by the **Director**, Vermont Service Center. The application is now before the Administrative Appeals Office on appeal. The appeal will be dismissed.

The applicant claims to be a citizen of El Salvador who is seeking Temporary Protected Status (TPS) under section 244 of the Immigration and Nationality Act (the Act), 8 U.S.C. § 1254.

The director withdrew the applicant's TPS because he found that the applicant had failed to submit requested court documentation relating to his criminal record.

On appeal, counsel for the applicant asserts he will provide the disposition as soon as it is available.

The director improperly referenced 8 C.F.R. § 244.14(a)(3) in withdrawing the application for failing to properly re-register, and should have referenced 8 C.F.R. § 244.14(a)(1) because the alien was in fact no longer eligible for TPS due to his misdemeanor convictions in the United States. An application or petition that fails to comply with the technical requirements of the law may be denied by the AAO even if the Service Center does not identify all of the grounds for denial in the initial decision. *See Spencer Enterprises, Inc. v. United States*, 229 F. Supp. 2d 1025, 1043 (E.D. Cal. 2001), *affd.* 345 F.3d 683 (9th Cir. 2003); *see also Dar v. INS*, 891 F.2d 997, 1002 n. 9 (2d Cir. 1989)(noting that the AAO reviews appeals on a de novo basis).

Section 244(c) of the Act, and the related regulations in 8 C.F.R. § 244.2, provide that an applicant who is a national of a foreign state is eligible for TPS only if such alien establishes that he or she:

- (a) Is a national of a state designated under section 244(b) of the Act;
- (b) Has been continuously physically present in the United States since the effective date of the most recent designation of that foreign state;
- (c) Has continuously resided in the United States since such date as the Attorney General may designate;
- (d) Is admissible as an immigrant except as provided under section 244.3;
- (e) Is not ineligible under 8 C.F.R. § 244.4; and
- (f)
 - (1) Registers for Temporary Protected Status during the initial registration period announced by public notice in the FEDERAL REGISTER, or
 - (2) During any subsequent extension of such designation if at the time of the initial registration period:
 - (i) The applicant is a nonimmigrant or has been granted voluntary departure status or any relief from removal;

(ii) The applicant has an application for change of status, adjustment of status, asylum, voluntary departure, or any relief from removal which is pending or subject to further review or appeal;

(iii) The applicant is a parolee or has a pending request for reparole; or

(iv) The applicant is a spouse or child of an alien currently eligible to be a TPS registrant.

An alien shall not be eligible for temporary protected status under this section if the Secretary of the Department of Homeland Security finds that the alien has been convicted of any felony or two or more misdemeanors committed in the United States. See Section 244(c)(2)(B)(i) of the Act and 8 C.F.R. § 244.4(a).

8 C.F.R. § 244.1 defines "felony" and "misdemeanor:"

Felony means a crime committed in the United States, punishable by imprisonment for a term of more than one year, regardless of the term such alien actually served, if any, except: When the offense is defined by the State as a misdemeanor and the sentence actually imposed is one year or less regardless of the term such alien actually served. Under this exception for purposes of section 244 of the Act, the crime shall be treated as a misdemeanor.

Misdemeanor means a crime committed in the United States, either

- (1) Punishable by imprisonment for a term of one year or less, regardless of the term such alien actually served, if any, or
- (2) A crime treated as a misdemeanor under the term "felony" of this section.

For purposes of this definition, any crime punishable by imprisonment for a maximum term of five days or less shall not be considered a misdemeanor.
8 C.F.R. § 244.1.

The record reveals the following offenses:

- (1) On August 6, 2000, the applicant was arrested by t _____ artment, New Jersey, for Possession of a Weapon. Case No. _____
- (2) On December 15, 2003, the applicant was arrested by the Englewood Police Department, New Jersey, for Simple Assault. Case No. ~~NO. _____~~
- (3) On December 15, 2003, the applicant was arrested by the Englewood Police Department, New Jersey, for Terroristic Threats. Case No. _____
- (4) On February 23, 2005, the applicant was arrested by the Englewood Police Department, New Jersey, for Simple Assault. Case No. _____
- (5) On February 23, 2005, the applicant was arrested by the Englewood Police Department, New Jersey, for Stalking. Case No. _____

(6) On February 23, 2005, the applicant was arrested by the Englewood Police Department, New Jersey, for Threatening to Kill. Case No. [REDACTED]

Pursuant to a letter dated August 15, 2006, the applicant was requested to submit the final court disposition for any and all charges on his criminal record. The applicant did not respond.

The director determined that the applicant had failed to submit evidence necessary for the proper adjudication of the application and denied the application on June 27, 2007.

On appeal, the applicant has provided a disposition sheet for the charges stemming from his December 2003, and February 2005 arrests. The disposition sheets do not clearly indicate whether the applicant had the charges against him completely dismissed, or whether the listed charges were dismissed as part of a plea agreement on reduced charges (noted on the disposition sheet as "downgraded to Harassment). Thus, it is not clear if the applicant has had all charges against him dismissed completely, or if he was convicted of lesser charges in response to the dismissal of the charges listed at numbers 2 through 6 above. In addition, the applicant has not provided the final disposition of the charge listed at number I, above.

The applicant has failed to provide any evidence revealing the final court disposition of his arrest detailed at number one above and the documents pertaining to his five other charges are inconclusive. The applicant is ineligible for Temporary Protected Status because of his failure to provide information necessary for the adjudication of his application. 8 C.F.R. § 244.9(a). Consequently, the director's decision to deny the application for this reason will be affirmed.

The applicant failed to reveal his criminal charges as required on the Form 1-821, Application for Temporary Protected Status. Every proscribed form submitted shall be executed according to instructions on the form, failure to do so can lead to the dismissal of an application for abandonment. 8 C.F.R. § 103.2(a)(I); 8 C.F.R. § 103.2(13). Failure to submit requested evidence that precludes a material line of inquiry shall be grounds for denying the petition. 8 C.F.R. § 103.2(b)(14). Any future proceedings under this application must include a waiver for failure to reveal criminal charges as required on the initial application.

An alien applying for temporary protected status has the burden of proving that he or she meets the requirements enumerated above and is otherwise eligible under the provisions of section 244 of the Act. The applicant has failed to meet this burden.

ORDER: The appeal is dismissed.
