What if my Form I-94 has incorrect information on it?

If your **Form I-94**, *Arrival-Departure Record* was issued by U.S. Customs and Border Protection (CBP) (at a Port of Entry) and it has an error, you should go to the nearest CBP Office with proof of entry or admission and the Form I-94, and request a new Form I-94.

If the Form I-94 was issued by USCIS (at a local USCIS office or from a USCIS Service Center) and it has an error, you should go to the nearest USCIS local office and request a new Form I-94. If the officer at the local office is not convinced that the Form I-94 was issued in error, the officer may advise you to file a **Form I-102**, *Application for Replacement/Initial Nonimmigrant Arrival Departure Document*.

What if my Form I-94 has been lost, stolen, mutilated, or destroyed?

If your Form I-94 has been lost, stolen, mutilated, or destroyed, you will need to apply for a replacement Form I-94. You'll need to file a Form I-102.
