







DISCUSSION: The application was denied by the Director, California Service Center. The application is now before the Administrative Appeals Office on appeal. The appeal will be dismissed.

The applicant is a native and citizen of Honduras who is seeking Temporary Protected Status (TPS) under section 244 of the Immigration and Nationality Act (the Act), 8 U.S.C. §1254.

The director determined that the applicant had been convicted of two misdemeanors in the United States. The director, therefore, denied the application.

On appeal, the applicant states that the director's decision is legally and actually inaccurate.

Section 244(c) of the Act, and the related regulations in 8 C.F.R. § 244.2, provide that an applicant who is a national of a foreign state designated by the Attorney General is eligible for temporary protected status only if such alien establishes that he or she:

- (a) Is a national, as defined in section 101(a)(21) of the Act, of a foreign state designated under section 244(b) of the Act;
- (b) Has been continuously physically present in the United States since the effective date of the most recent designation of that foreign state;
- (c) Has continuously resided in the United States since such date as the Attorney General may designate;
- (d) Is admissible as an immigrant except as provided under section 244.3;
- (e) Is not ineligible under 8 C.F.R. § 244.4; and
- (f)
 - (1) Registers for TPS during the initial registration period announced by public notice in the *Federal Register*, or
 - (2) During any subsequent extension of such designation, if at the time of the initial registration period:....

Section 244(c) ALIENS ELIGIBLE FOR TEMPORARY PROTECTED STATUS.-

(2) ELIGIBILITY STANDARDS.-

(B) ALIENS INELIGIBLE. - An alien shall not be eligible for temporary protected status under this section if the Attorney General finds that-

- (i) the alien has been convicted of any felony or 2 misdemeanors committed in the United States,....

"Misdemeanor" means a crime committed in the United States, either (1) punishable by imprisonment for a term of one year or less, regardless of the term such alien actually served, if any, or (2) a crime treated as a

misdemeanor under the term "felony" of this section. For purposes of this definition, any crime punishable by imprisonment for a maximum term of five days or less shall not be considered a misdemeanor. 8 C.F.R. § 244.1.

The record reveals:

1. On October 24, 2000, the Los Angeles Police Department arrested the applicant for "Und Inflnce Alchl/Drug in Veh.", ".08% more Wght Alchl Drive Veh.", "Unlicensed Driver." On November 14, 2000, the applicant was convicted of "Reckless Driving /No Injury." The other three charges were dismissed.
2. On April 30, 2001, the Los Angeles Police Department arrested the applicant for "Inf Corp Inj, Spouse/Cohab." The applicant was released and this charge was dismissed on April 30, 2001.
3. On August 26, 2004, the Norwalk, California Sheriff's Department arrested the applicant for "Batter Agnst Frmr Spse/Fiancee." On September 15, 2004, the applicant was convicted of "Challenge to Fight in Public." The other charge was dismissed.

On appeal, counsel asserts that the denial of the applicant's TPS application was incorrect; however, counsel does not cite an erroneous conclusion of law or any specific defect in the director's decision.

The applicant is ineligible for temporary protected status because of his two misdemeanor convictions. 8 C.F.R. § 244.4(a).

The burden of proof is upon the applicant to establish that he or she meets the above requirements. The applicant's statement, on appeal, does not overcome the adverse evidence in the record. Consequently, the director's decision to deny the application for temporary protected status will be affirmed.

An alien applying for temporary protected status has the burden of proving that he or she meets the requirements enumerated above and is otherwise eligible under the provisions of section 244 of the Act. The applicant has failed to meet this burden.

ORDER: The appeal is dismissed.
