DISCUSSION: The application was denied by the Director, California Service Center. A subsequent application for re-registration was denied by the Director, California Service Center, and is currently before the Administrative Appeals Office (AAO) on appeal. The initial application will be reopened, *sua sponte*, by the Chief, Administrative Appeals Office, and the case will be remanded for further consideration and action.

The applicant claims to be a citizen of El Salvador who is seeking Temporary Protected Status (TPS) under section 244 of the Immigration and Nationality Act (the Act), 8 U.S.C. § 1254.

The record reveals that the applicant filed a TPS application during the initial registration period on April 12, 2001, under receipt number SRC 01 175 56543. The Director, Texas Service Center, denied that application due to abandonment on July 9, 2002, because the applicant failed to submit requested court documentation relating to her criminal record. A denial due to abandonment may not be appealed, but an applicant or petitioner may file a motion to reopen within 30 days. There is nothing in the record to indicate that the applicant filed a motion to reopen the director's decision. The applicant filed another TPS application on September 23, 2002. The Director, Texas Service Center denied that application on July 8, 2003. On November 10, 2003, the applicant filed an appeal from the denial decision. The Director Texas Service Center, rejected the motion as untimely filed. However, the record of proceedings contains a copy of the final disposition relating to the applicant's criminal record. That disposition reveals that he applicant was only convicted of one misdemeanor.

There are no other known grounds of ineligibility; consequently, the director's decision will be withdrawn. However, the validity period of the applicant's fingerprint check has expired.

Accordingly, the case is remanded for the purpose of sending the applicant a fingerprint notification form, and affording her the opportunity to comply with its requirements. Thereafter, the director will render a new decision. Should the decision be adverse, the director must give written notice setting forth the specific reasons for the denial pursuant to 8 C.F.R. § 103.3(a)(1)(i), and the applicant shall be permitted to file an appeal without fee.

As always in these proceedings, the burden of proof rests solely with the applicant. Section 291 of the Act, 8 U.S.C. § 1361.

ORDER: The initial application is reopened, the director's decision is withdrawn, and the application is remanded for a new decision. The re-registration application is remanded for further action consistent with the director's new decision on the initial application.
