# **SECURING U.S. CITIZENSHIP FOR YOUR CHILD**

Information for Adoptive Parents of Children Issued IH-4 and IR-4 Visas

#### WHY SHOULD I SECURE U.S. CITIZENSHIP FOR MY CHILD?

U.S. citizenship offers many benefits and important responsibilities including being able to:

- Obtain and travel with a U.S. passport;
- Vote in federal elections and serve on a jury after they turn age 18;
- · Become eligible for certain federal jobs, benefits, grants, and scholarships; and
- · Keep residency in the United States.

## **HOW CAN MY CHILD ACQUIRE U.S. CITIZENSHIP?**

Your child may acquire U.S. citizenship under the Immigration and Nationality Act (INA), Section 320, if they meet the following conditions **before their 18th birthday**:

- Qualify as a child and meet requirements applicable to adopted children under INA 101(b)(1)(E), (F), or (G);
- Are admitted to the United States as a lawful permanent resident;
- · Reside in the United States in the legal and physical custody of a U.S. citizen parent; and
- · Have an adoption that is considered final.

### WHAT SHOULD I DO NEXT TO SECURE U.S. CITIZENSHIP FOR MY CHILD?

- 1. You may wish to contact your adoption service provider or legal representative to discuss your specific next steps.
- 2. To obtain an adoption that is considered final, you (and your spouse, if married) must adopt or readopt your child in a U.S. state court, or your foreign adoption must be recognized by your state of residence. Evidence of this might include a certificate of recognition of adoption from the state court or a copy of the state statute providing that the state recognizes all foreign adoptions. - 3. Your child will automatically acquire U.S. citizenship when they meet the conditions of INA 320 described above, including having an adoption this is considered final.
- 4. If you would like proof of your child's U.S. citizenship, you may file Form N-600, Application for Certificate of Citizenship, (<a href="www.uscis.gov/n-600">www.uscis.gov/n-600</a>) after your child meets all the conditions to acquire U.S. citizenship. A Certificate of Citizenship does not expire. You may also apply for a U.S. passport for your child with the Department of State.
