What is the Form I-730?



The Form I-730 is a petition that principal refugees and asylees can submit to USCIS for eligible family members to obtain derivative status in the United Status. There is no fee to







Use Form I-730

To request that your qualifying spouse and unmarried children under 21 years of age receive derivative status.



Principal Refugee or Asylee

- a principal refugee admitted to the United States within the past 2 years,
- a principal asylee granted asylum within the past 2 years, or
- a lawful permanent resident who was admitted to the United States as a principal refugee or granted asylum as a principal asylee within the past 2 years.

How Will I Be Able to Check Form I-730 Case Processing Time?




Step 1: Visit the 'Check Case Processing Times' webpage at https://egov.uscis.gov/processing-times.

Step 2: In the three drop-down menus, select:

- Form: Form I-730 Refugee/Asylee
 Relative Petition
- Form Category: Petition for accompanying family members of an asylee
- Field Office or Service Center: Select the office where your case is being adjudicated.

Step 3: Click on 'Get processing time.'

Form I-730 Processing Update



Before Jan. 1, 2023

Form I-730 petitions were sent to either the Nebraska Service Center and Texas Service Center.

As of Jan. 1, 2023

All Form I-730 petitions are being sent to:

All other aspects of processing have not changed.

Refugee-based Form I-730 Petitions




Refugee-based petitions:

• All petitions including those with overseas and domestic beneficiaries are sent immediately to RAIO after data entry.

Stakeholder Question: Processing Times





Question:

• We noticed that the median processing time for Form I-730 in FY 2022 was 28.6 months and in FY 2023, it is 14 months. Will you please describe what efforts have contributed to this change?



Answer:

- COVID-19 had previously affected Form I-730 processing.
- Additional staff have been assigned to adjudicate Form I-730 cases.
- As a result, processing time has come down.

Stakeholder Question: Historical Processing Times







 Please share whether the data from the Historic Processing Times webpage is for domestic processing or whether it includes the entire adjudication timeline of a Form I-730?



- Reflects processing times at the USCIS Service Centers that handle Form I-730 cases.
- The Historical Processing Times page uses a median 50th percentile statistic, while the main case processing times page uses the 80th percentile statistics.
- Averages service center data over the course of a fiscal year; not location-specific processing times covering 6 months of data.

Cycle Time Goals



- Form I-730 target times are measured using 'cycle times.'
- A cycle time measures how many months' worth of pending cases for a particular form are waiting on a decision.
- New cycle times goals established in March 2022 are internal metrics that guide USCIS' backlog reduction efforts.



I-730, Refugee/Asylee Relative Petition

 ALERT: As announced in January 2023, all Form I-730 petitions should be filed at the Texas Service Center. We will reject any Form I-730 petition mailed to the Nebraska Service Center or the other USCIS

As we move toward an increasingly electronic environment, we now scan and upload many documents Into electronic database systems. To help us process your petition as efficiently as possible, read our Recommendations for Paper Filings to Avoid Scanning Delays.

 REMINDER: Please submit a passport-style photograph of each family member you are petitioning for. If you do not provide the required photo, we may issue a Request for Evidence, and it could take longer

If you are a principal refugee admitted to the United States within the past 2 years or a principal asylee who was granted asylum within the past 2 years, you (the petitioner) may use this form to request that your spouse and unmarried children under 21 years of age (the beneficiaries) Join you in the United States. In certain circumstances, unmarried children over 21 years old may be eligible for following-to-join immigration benefits. For more Information, see our Child Status Protection Act page. Updated Guidance on the Form I-730 webpage:

- How to identify where your Form I-730 is being processed.

Expanded Information on Processing Times



- Will include information for each step of Form I-730 processing within USCIS. Steps include:
 - Initial domestic processing and interview
 - Additional processing times for USCIS directorates (SCOPS, FOD, RAIO)
- Expanded times will not include information from the Department of State (DOS).
- Development work is underway to provide this additional reporting.
 - Anticipated release in late summer 2023.

Specific Population: Beneficiaries from Afghanistan



- USCIS is prioritizing Form I-730 petitions for Afghan nationals.
 - As of March 1, 2023, there are 545 Afghan Form I-730 petitions pending with USCIS.
- USCIS is working closely with DOS to identify how to process Form I-730 petitions in locations outside the United States where there is not a U.S. government presence.
 - Form I-730 petitioners and beneficiaries must always provide an updated address using the instructions at <u>uscis.gov/i-730</u> for the beneficiary's location so either USCIS or DOS can process the beneficiary in a third country.

Case Management System





- Will use a single system to consolidate processing and case management of newly filed Form I-730 petitions.
 - Will streamline processing, simplify internal actions for staff, and reduce burdens with transferring files across USCIS components and external partners.

Customer Service





- Based on public feedback, USCIS is updating guidance for Contact Center staff to clearly respond to Form I-730 questions, including questions on:
 - Processing steps
 - Specific actions by petitioners for expedite requests
 - Other status inquiries

New Requests for Evidence Templates



- Based on public feedback, USCIS has updated templates used for Form I-730 Requests for Evidence.
 - Revised templates will provide greater clarity and details regarding specific legal and evidentiary bases for requests.



Backlog Reduction Efforts



- Two teams deployed to the Asylum Vetting Center (ZGA) to conduct supervisory review of Form I-730 petitions.
- Working to facilitate remote review and processing of Form I-730 following-to-join refugee petitions pending at ZGA.
- Efforts to reduce the Form I-730 workload backlog will continue this year.
