DISCUSSION: The service center director denied the nonimmigrant visa petition and the matter is now before the Administrative Appeals Office (AAO) on appeal. The appeal will be summarily dismissed.

The petitioner is a corporation in the business of providing software consulting, outsourcing, and project management services. To employ the beneficiary in a position that the petitioner designates as a programmer analyst, the petitioner filed this H-1B petition to classify the beneficiary as a nonimmigrant worker in a specialty occupation pursuant to section 101(a)(15)(H)(i)(b) of the Immigration and Nationality Act (the Act), 8 U.S.C. § 1101(a)(15)(H)(i)(b).

The director denied the petition based upon her determination that unresolved discrepancies between wages recorded in pay records submitted by the petitioner and the wages that it was obligated to pay its H-1B employees undermined the credibility of the petitioner's representations in the present petition, particularly with regard to the petitioner's intent to comply with the terms and conditions of employment specified in the petition.

On May 19, 2009, the petitioner's president submitted a Form I-290B (Notice of Appeal or Motion) without a brief or evidence. The only comment that the petitioner submits about the appeal is its president's statement at Part 3 of the Form I-290B, which reads:

As checked in part two [of] item B[,] additional evidence and[/]or my brief will be submitted to the AAO within 30 days

Although the petitioner's president checked box B at section 2 of the Form I-290B, indicating that he would send a brief and/or evidence within 30 days, the AAO has received neither. Accordingly, the record of proceeding is deemed complete as currently constituted.

An officer to whom an appeal is taken shall summarily dismiss any appeal when the party concerned fails to identify specifically any erroneous conclusion of law or statement of fact for the appeal. 8 C.F.R. § 103.3(a)(1)(v).

Counsel fails to specify how the director made any erroneous conclusion of law or statement of fact in denying the petition. As neither the petitioner nor counsel presents additional evidence on appeal to overcome the decision of the director, the appeal will be summarily dismissed in accordance with 8 C.F.R. § 103.3(a)(1)(v).

The burden of proof in this proceeding rests solely with the petitioner. Section 291 of the Act, 8 U.S.C. § 1361. The petitioner has not sustained that burden.

ORDER: The appeal is summarily dismissed.
