**DISCUSSION:** The applicant's Temporary Protected Status was withdrawn by the Director, Vermont Service Center. The applicant filed a motion to reopen that was denied by the Director, Vermont Service Center, and is now before the Administrative Appeals Office (AAO) on appeal. The appeal will be dismissed.

The applicant claims to be a citizen of El Salvador who is seeking Temporary Protected Status (TPS) under section 244 of the Immigration and Nationality Act (the Act), 8 U.S.C. § 1254.

The record reveals that the applicant filed a TPS application during the initial registration period on March 16, 2001, under receipt number EAC 01 149 51483. The Director, California Service Center, approved that application on November 22, 2002.

The director may withdraw the status of an alien granted Temporary Protected Status under section 244 of the Act at any time if it is determined that the alien was not in fact eligible at the time such status was granted, or at any time thereafter becomes ineligible for such status. 8.C.F.R. § 244.14(a)(1).

The director withdrew temporary protected status because the applicant had been convicted of two misdemeanors in the United States.

An alien shall not be eligible for temporary protected status under this section if the Secretary of the Department of Homeland Security finds that the alien has been convicted of any felony or two or more misdemeanors committed in the United States. See Section 244(c)(2)(B)(i) of the Act and 8 C.F.R. § 244.4(a).

8 C.F.R. § 244.1 defines "felony" and "misdemeanor:"

*Felony* means a crime committed in the United States, punishable by imprisonment for a term of more than one year, regardless of the term such alien actually served, if any, except: When the offense is defined by the State as a misdemeanor and the sentence actually imposed is one year or less regardless of the term such alien actually served. Under this exception for purposes of section 244 of the Act, the crime shall be treated as a misdemeanor.

*Misdemeanor* means a crime committed in the United States, either

- (1) Punishable by imprisonment for a term of one year or less, regardless of the term such alien actually served, if any, or
- (2) A crime treated as a misdemeanor under the term "felony" of this section.

For purposes of this definition, any crime punishable by imprisonment for a maximum term of five days or less shall not be considered a misdemeanor. 8 C.F.R. § 244.1.

The record reveals the following offenses:

- (1) On March 21, 1997, the applicant was arrested by the Chesapeake, Virginia Police Department for "Failure to Appear on Misdemeanor Charge." [REDACTED]
- (2) On April 17, 1999, the applicant was arrested by the Immigration and Naturalization Service (INS) for "Concealment of Facts of Re-Entry." [REDACTED]

Pursuant to a letter dated December 23, 2001, the applicant was requested to submit the final court disposition for each of the charges detailed above. The applicant provided the requested court documentation. According to the final court dispositions, on April 11, 1997, the applicant pled guilty to and was convicted of "Failure to Appear," a misdemeanor and on April 19, 1999, the applicant pled guilty to and was convicted of "Concealment of Facts of Re-Entry," a misdemeanor.

The director withdrew temporary protected status because the applicant had been convicted of two misdemeanors in the United States.

On appeal, counsel for the applicant claims that the applicant was only convicted of "Failure to Appear", and is therefore eligible for TPS. However, United States Citizenship and Immigration Services (USCIS) records clearly show that the applicant was convicted of two misdemeanors as described above. Consequently, the director's decision to withdraw the applicant's Temporary Protected Status will be affirmed.

The applicant is ineligible for TPS because of his misdemeanors convictions.

Furthermore, it is noted that the applicant has provided insufficient evidence to establish his qualifying continuous residence since February 13, 2001 and continuous physical presence from March 9, 2001 to the filing date of the TPS application. It is also noted that although the applicant has submitted a copy of a birth certificate with English translation, it was not accompanied by a passport or any national identity document from the alien's country of origin bearing photo and/or fingerprint to establish his nationality and identity. Therefore, the application must be denied for these reasons as well.

The application will be denied for the above stated reasons, with each considered as an independent and alternative basis for denial. An alien applying for temporary protected status has the burden of proving that he or she meets the requirements enumerated above and is otherwise eligible under the provisions of section 244 of the Act. The applicant has failed to meet this burden.

**ORDER:** The appeal is dismissed.
