**DISCUSSION:** The applicant's Temporary Protected Status was withdrawn by the Director, Vermont Service Center, and is now before the Administrative Appeals Office (AAO) on appeal. The appeal will be dismissed.

The applicant is a citizen of El Salvador who is seeking Temporary Protected Status (TPS) under section 244 of the Immigration and Nationality Act (the Act), 8 U.S.C. § 1254.

The record reveals that the applicant filed a TPS application during the initial registration period on February 28, 2002, under receipt number WAC 02 123 53101. The Director, California Service Center, approved that application on September 16, 2002.

The director may withdraw the status of an alien granted Temporary Protected Status under section 244 of the Act at any time if it is determined that the alien was not in fact eligible at the time such status was granted, or at any time thereafter becomes ineligible for such status. 8.C.F.R. § 244.14(a)(1).

The director withdrew temporary protected status because the applicant had been convicted of two or more misdemeanors committed in the United States.

On appeal, the applicant requests that the director reconsider the decision to deny his TPS application.

An alien shall not be eligible for temporary protected status under this section if the Secretary of the Department of Homeland Security finds that the alien has been convicted of any felony or two or more misdemeanors committed in the United States. See Section 244(c)(2)(B)(i) of the Act and 8 C.F.R. § 244.4(a).

8 C.F.R. § 244.1 defines "felony" and "misdemeanor:"

*Felony* means a crime committed in the United States, punishable by imprisonment for a term of more than one year, regardless of the term such alien actually served, if any, except: When the offense is defined by the State as a misdemeanor and the sentence actually imposed is one year or less regardless of the term such alien actually served. Under this exception for purposes of section 244 of the Act, the crime shall be treated as a misdemeanor.

*Misdemeanor* means a crime committed in the United States, either

- (1) Punishable by imprisonment for a term of one year or less, regardless of the term such alien actually served, if any, or
- (2) A crime treated as a misdemeanor under the term "felony" of this section.

For purposes of this definition, any crime punishable by imprisonment for a maximum term of five days or less shall not be considered a misdemeanor. 8 C.F.R. § 244.1.

An alien is inadmissible if he has been convicted of a crime involving moral turpitude (other than a purely political offense), or if he admits having committed such crime, or if he admits committing an act which constitutes the essential elements of such crime. Section 212(a)(2)(A)(i)(I) of the Act.

The record reveals the following offenses:

- (1) On July 11, 2004, the applicant was arrested by the Wautoma, Wisconsin Sheriff's Office for "Operate w/o Valid License." [REDACTED]
- (2) On March 28, 2005, the applicant was arrested by the Wautoma, Wisconsin Sheriff's Office for two counts of "Disorderly Conduct – Domestic Abuse Related." [REDACTED]
- (3) On July 13, 2005, the applicant was arrested by the Wautoma, Wisconsin Sheriff's Office for "Operating While Revoked." [REDACTED]
- (4) On March 19, 2006, the applicant was arrested by the Wautoma, Wisconsin Sheriff's Office for "Disorderly Conduct – Domestic Abuse Related," and "Bail Jumping." [REDACTED]
- (5) On November 14, 2006, the applicant was arrested by the Wautoma, Wisconsin Sheriff's Office for "Operating While Revoked," and "Probation Violation." [REDACTED]

Pursuant to a letter dated March 31, 2008, the applicant was requested to submit the final court disposition for each of the charges detailed above. The applicant submitted the requested court documents. According to the court dispositions, on August 23, 2004, the applicant pled guilty and was convicted of "Operate w/o/Valid License," a misdemeanor. On April 7, 2006, the applicant pled No Contest to and was convicted of "Disorderly Conduct," a misdemeanor. On April 13, 2005, the applicant pled No Contest to and was convicted of "Operating While Revoked," a misdemeanor. On April 7, 2006, the applicant pled No Contest to and was convicted of "Disorderly Conduct," a misdemeanor. On June 1, 2007, the applicant pled guilty and was convicted of "Operating While Revoked," a misdemeanor.

The director withdrew temporary protected status because the applicant had been convicted of more than two misdemeanors.

On appeal, the applicant requests that the director reconsider his decision because he depends on TPS to support his family in El Salvador.

The applicant is ineligible for TPS because of his misdemeanor convictions.

An alien applying for temporary protected status has the burden of proving that he or she meets the requirements enumerated above and is otherwise eligible under the provisions of section 244 of the Act. The applicant has failed to meet this burden.

**ORDER:** The appeal is dismissed.
